If you love spring wild flowers, I recommend a visit to Daniel Wright Woods, a prime location for the woodland spring ephemerals. On a recent visit there I found spring beauties, trout lilies, and white trillium creating a carpet of bloom under the trees.

And when the flowers are out, the insects emerge. As I write these remarks I'm sitting in my backyard watching the bumblebees and some fascinating bee mimics buzz over the garden. The mimics look very much like bumblebees, complete with a heavy-bodied, zigzag pattern of flight and buzzing sounds. However, on closer examination they turn out to be beetles, and their



common name is the very appropriate "bumblebee scarab." Please remember our photo competition challenge of Bees, Butterflies, and Bugs,

and be sure to snap photos of some of the small, but fascinating, insects that visit your garden.

And speaking of insects, at our April 11 club meeting, Melissa Alderson, of the Lake County Forest Preserve, gave a fascinating and entertaining presentation entitled "Pollination: Plant Survival Tactics." As Melissa emphasized, pollinators are vital to human life on the planet, and as gardeners we can do our part to provide habitat and food for bees, butterflies, and other pollinators.



Melissa's talk was followed by our monthly plant competition, which included a large number of beautiful entries. And as always, we followed up with treats and good conversation. Thanks

The photo competition for the club was created to help all of us get better at taking photos of our flowers, plants, and gardens.
