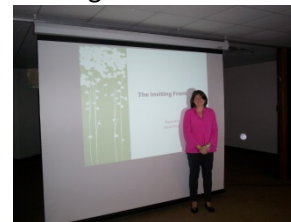
President's Message: by Karen O'Hayer

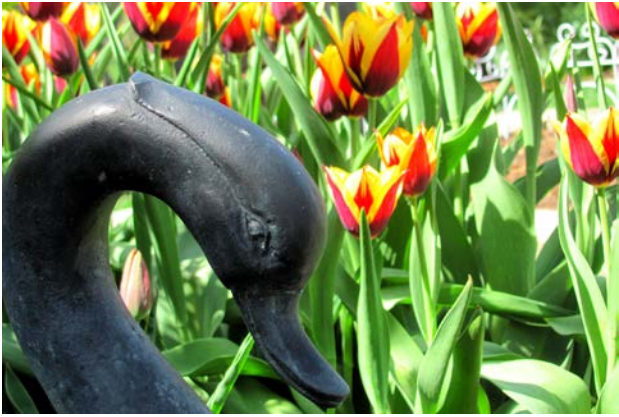
