## 2017 Rose Garden Award- Andy Plasz

At the annual dinner in December, Karen O'Hayer and Andy Kimmel were awarded the 2017 Rose Garden Volunteer Award. The award was started by Geewananda Gunawardana, who was curator of the garden from 1995 to June 2001. Gee donated the travelling plaque to be given to the club member who was the outstanding volunteer for each annual growing season. This year's winners were tied in hours going into the last weekend of the season and they both showed up along with 8 other club members and 2 Community Service Volunteers and despite strong winds and some snow early, we put the rose garden to bed for the winter.

All told, members of the Gardeners of Central Lake County and nonmembers put in 562 people hours of work in the Cook Park Lynn Arthur Rose Garden during 2017. Some 36 folk did volunteer work in the Lynn Arthur Rose Garden this year. Twenty two folk were nonmembers of the Gardeners of Central Lake County and donated 220 hours of effort.
